- Geographically and culturally diverse = myriad lifestyle opportunities.
 - Historical to modern, cosmopolitan to rural, mountain to island to beach, and more.
- Historic, Old World living.
- Low cost of living.
- Excellent health care and amenities.
- Easy access to Europe.

At A Glance

- <u>Residency Visas</u>
 - Non-Lucrative Residence Visa.
 - Golden Visa.
- Health Care
 - **Public and private health systems** operate—retirees (or "jubilados") usually use private insurance for access to private facilities—complete care for a 68-year-old is 155 euros per month.
- Ease Of Access
 - Two international flight hubs in Madrid and Barcelona.
 - Many low-cost European airlines operate in secondary cities.



Country Pros

- Affordable cost of living, especially right now.
- Geographic diversity—Mediterranean beaches to the Pyrenees mountains.
- Madrid and Barcelona—top city lifestyle in Europe.
- Culturally rich—melting pot of different cultures.
- Easy access to Europe.
- High quality infrastructure and amenities.



Country Cons

- High taxes.
- High minimum income requirement for Non-Lucrative Visa.
- Bureaucracy—lots of red tape.
- Slow pace of life, siesta culture.
- Learning Spanish is most likely necessary.

San Sebastián





San Sebastián Pros

- One of Europe's gastronomic capitals (especially "pintxos").
- Attractive, walkable city with lots to see and do.
- Range of beaches available from city center, from calm waters to surfable waves.
- Vineyards are close by.
- Authentic—no huge tourism presence.
- Proximity to Southern France.

San Sebastián Cons

- Language can be complicated.
- Lack of expat presence.
- Cloudy for the majority of the year. Cool winters—daily mean of 49°F.
- Difficult to access. No international airport.

Barcelona





Barcelona Pros

- Barcelona is the economic, cultural, and administrative capital of Catalonia.
- Vibrant, proud, interesting place—culturally and linguistically distinct from the rest of Spain.
- Famous for art and architecture, museums and galleries, monuments, restaurants, shopping... all the stuff of cities.
- It has a beach—this is one of the Med's biggest metropolises.
- Well-connected: low-cost airlines, high-speed trains, ferry services to Balearics.

Barcelona Cons

- Lots of tourists most of the year.
- Petty crime is constant.
- Hot and sticky in July and August.
- Strong Catalan/separatist movement—anti-Madrid sentiment.
- Property prices and general living costs higher than most other Spanish cities.

- Gastronomic hot spot.


OVERSEAS

Granada





Granada Pros

- Access to the Sierra Nevada mountains.
- Beautiful historical town center—Moorish influences.
- Low cost of living.
- Small, accessible, pedestrian-friendly city.
- Tapas culture.
- Four seasons.
- Friendly locals.

Granada Cons

- Small city—lack of entertainment options and amenities.
- Winters are surprisingly cold; summers are surprisingly hot.
- Small streets not very accessible for those with restricted mobility.
- Less accessible: Granada airport has limited flights—bus to Málaga or Almería.

Costa De La Luz Pros

- Low cost of living.
- Excellent weather and miles of uncrowded beaches.
- Historically interesting, vibrant local culture.
- Naturally beautiful—proximity to national parks/protected zones.
- Underrated golf destination.
- Connected via efficient train system.
- Pockets of expat communities.

Costa De La Luz Cons

- Too sunny?
- Need to learn Spanish.
- Limited entertainment options.
- Strong siesta culture.
